

Northern Italy

Curtain up on the history of Europe!

The European Route of Historic Theatres connects 120 of the most interesting, most beautiful and best preserved theatre buildings all over Europe. As monuments, all these theatres can be visited during the day. They tell us the story of Europe from the Renaissance to the 20th century.

Theatre is everywhere in Europe. It is part of our civilization. But it is a fleeting art: the moment a performance is over, it continues to exist only in the memory of the spectator. Nevertheless, there is one permanent expression of this art: the theatre buildings. Every theatre building tells us something about the time when it was built, the intentions of its builders, the relationship between audience and artists, the cooperation of the artists across all borders, and the changing times.

Furthermore there is a European aspect to all theatres: the architectural form as we know it today was developed in Italy in the 17th century and subsequently spread all over Europe. The theatre building has thereby become a truly European building. Every country, every era, every society further developed this model – giving us a rich heritage to discover today.

Twelve routes take you from theatre to theatre. Come and enjoy the surprising diversity of theatre buildings in historic city centres and beautiful countrysides!







From the midlands to the Baltic Sea – theatre in four nations

Focus on 1900: the Baltic Route presents highlights of art nouveau style in Tallinn, Tartu and Warsaw, splendid examples of eclecticism in Riga, Vilnius and Krakow, and Austrian neo-Baroque in Cieszyn. While the last palace theatre of the region, Lancut, and the royal theatre in Warsaw take you back to around 1800.
